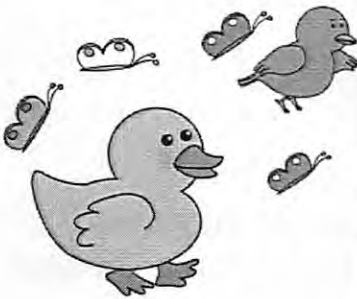

The Month of May

“May” is likely named after the Roman goddess Maia, who oversaw the growth of plants. Alternatively, the name might have come from the Latin *maiores*, “elders”.

May Calendar

May 1 is May Day. Mark the return of spring by bringing in branches of forsythia, lilacs, or other flowering shrubs from your region. May Day is also “Lei Day” in Hawaii. Leis are garlands or wreaths that are often made with native Hawaiian flowers such as plumeria. Nowadays, they are given as a symbol of greeting, farewell, affection, celebration, or honor, in the spirit of aloha.

May 5 is Cinco de Mayo (“The Fifth of May”). This day celebrates the victory of the Mexican army over the French army at The Battle of Puebla in 1862.

May 12 is Mother’s Day—don’t forget! Do you have something planned to show appreciation for your mother?

May 28 is Armed Forces Day, which honors those who serve in all branches of the United States military.

May 22 is National Maritime Day. Created in commemoration of the first transoceanic voyage via steamboat (completed by the U.S.S. Savannah in 1819), this holiday recognizes the efforts of the U.S. merchant marine during both war and peace.

May 20 is Victoria Day in Canada. This holiday celebrates the birthday of Queen Victoria, who was born on May 24, 1819. The holiday is observed on the penultimate Monday in May.

May 27 is Memorial Day—a poignant reminder of the tenacity of life. It’s tradition to raise the flag on this day;

May Full Moon

May's full Moon, called the **Flower Moon**, appears on Thursday, May 23, reaching peak illumination at 9:53 A.M. (EDT). It will be below the horizon at this time, so for the best view of this full Moon, step outside on the night of the 23rd or the 24th and look for that big, bright, shining lunar disk!

May Birth Symbols

May's **birth flowers** are the Hawthorn and the Lily-of-the-Valley. The hawthorn means hope, while the lily-of-the-valley symbolizes sweetness or the return of happiness.

May's **birthstone** is the emerald. Here are a few fun facts about emeralds:

- ☐ The emerald is a green type of beryl. Its color ranges from light to rich green; the more saturated hues are more valuable, especially if pure- or blue-green.
- ☐ Natural emeralds are flawed, with fractures or other materials mixed in, called inclusions, which may appear as needles, columns, or cubes of minerals or bubbles of gas or liquid. Sometimes oil or resin is added to fill fractures and improve appearance.
- ☐ Some of the best emeralds come from South American mines, although perhaps the oldest known came from Egypt. The emerald was a favorite gem of Cleopatra. The emerald symbolizes rebirth and fertility and was thought to grant foresight, cure various diseases, soothe nerves, improve memory, and ensure loyalty.

This Month in History

May 23: What's Your Name?

On this day in 1707, Swedish botanist and naturalist Carl Linnaeus was born. One of his major achievements was the formal introduction of a system of classifying and naming organisms according to genus and species, called binomial nomenclature. The method uses Latin words (a language commonly used by scholars in his day). For example, humans are classified as *Homo sapiens*. *Homo*, meaning "man," is the genus, and *sapiens*, meaning "wise," is the species. Several species may exist within one genus, but each species only has one scientific name. Scientists today use a modified version of Linnaeus's system. Because the same naming convention is used throughout the world, it eliminates much confusion when discussing organisms.

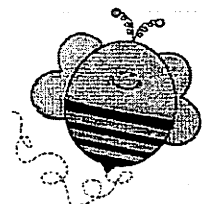
Carl Linnaeus originated the use of 0 (the symbol for Mars) to mean male and 1 (the symbol for Venus) to mean female.

May 26: Terrifying Twisters

On this day in 1917, tornadoes struck central Illinois, killing 101 people. Originally thought to be just one tornado that wreaked havoc along a 293-mile-long path, the outbreak was later determined to be four to eight tornadoes. One of them lasted 4 hours and followed a track 155 miles long (including the distance traveled while in the air). Mattoon and Charleston were especially hard hit by an F4 tornado (original Fujita scale). In Mattoon, almost 500 houses were destroyed.

According to newspaper reports:

- ☐ straw was driven 1/2 inch deep into a tree
- ☐ a flagpole with a flag was blown four blocks and planted upright in the ground
- books and other items were carried 50 to 70 miles away



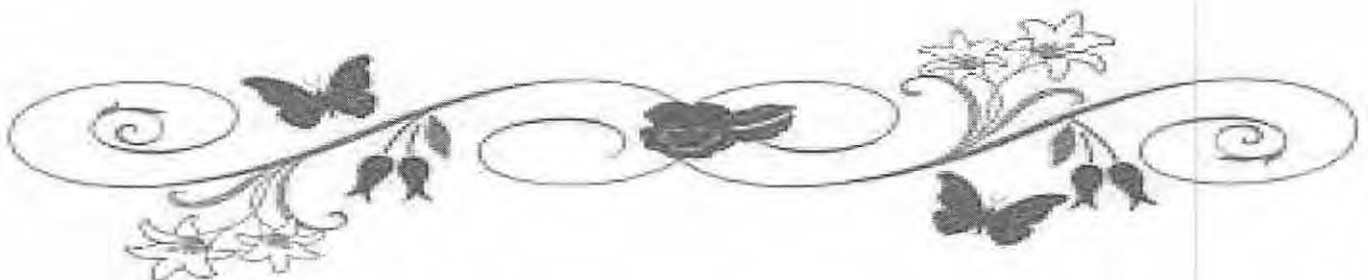
Calendar Question

According to astronomers, what is a Julian day?

Answer: The term “Julian Day” can be confusing because it has several meanings, including being a date on the Julian calendar. In astronomy, however, the Julian day (or Julian day number) is the number of days that have passed since the start of a Julian period. The Julian period is a year-numbering system developed by 16th-century French astronomer Joseph Justus Scaliger. He determined that the current Julian period began on January 1, 4713 B.C. of the Julian calendar; every 7,980 years, the count of years restarts.

For dating and comparing the timing of astronomical events and observations, John Herschel and other astronomers created a day-numbering system based on Scaliger’s Julian period. There are no months in a Julian day system; it simply counts the days, and fractions of days in decimals, since the period began. Julian day 0 occurred on January 1, 4713 B.C. The Julian day starts at noon Universal Time (Greenwich Mean Time), so that nighttime astronomical events occur on one Julian day.

A Julian date includes the fraction of a Julian day. For example, on May 1, 2016 (Gregorian calendar date), at midnight (the start of the day on a common calendar), the Julian day number was 2457509, and the Julian date was 2457509.5. On May 1, 2016, at noon, the Julian day number changed to 2457510 and the Julian date to 2457510.0.



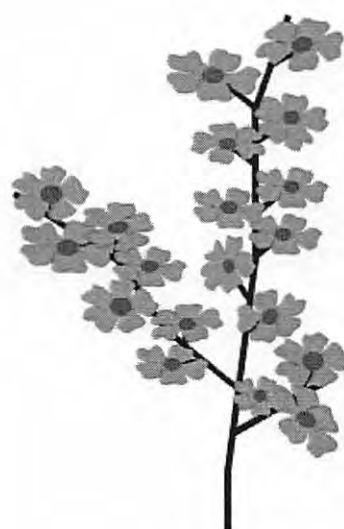
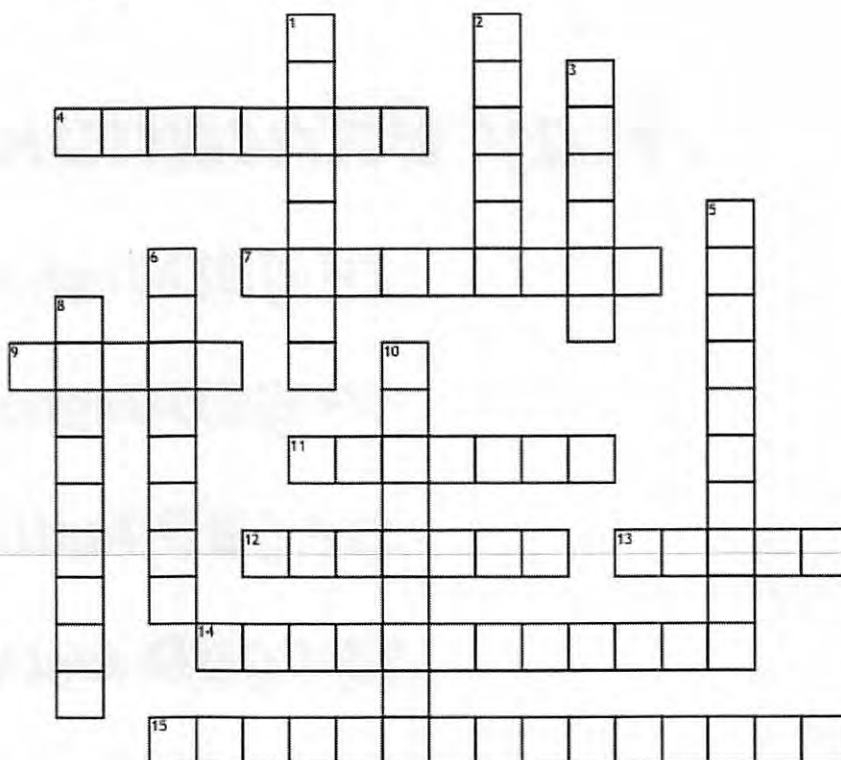

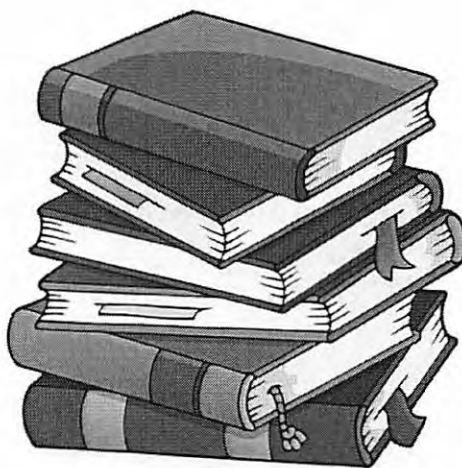

CBT illuminates the links between thoughts, emotions, behaviors, and physical health and uses those connections to develop concrete plans for self-improvement.

From Wars to Beer, Brunch & BBQ:

Cinco de Mayo (Beer!) - On May 5, 1862, Mexico defeated French imperialists at the Battle of Puebla, led by General Ignacio Zaragoza (a familiar name). But that's not Mexican Independence Day, which is 9/16. Today, Cinco de Mayo is more popular in America than in Mexico because Corona beer has a good marketing department. (Was defeating the French really *that* impressive?)

Mother's Day (Brunch!) - It began in Europe after WWI. So many young men died that governments rewarded reproduction. Today we appreciate all moms, but it used to be just the ones who had LOTS of kids! They got rewards and were celebrated in the news - for producing what would become WWII's hero-victims. America's "Baby Boom" happened after WWII, when the GI Bill (re-distributed to whites only at the time) helped subsidize them.

Memorial Day (BBQ!) - Memorial Day was created by the *Grand Army of the Republic*, a Veterans group founded after the Civil War by Union (The North) soldiers. We remember and respect the ultimate sacrifice soldiers make in war.

"*Holiday*" means "*holy day*" but as the 3 popular May holidays above show, many holidays originate from war, which is seldom holy.

Wars are usually started by rich old men with economic interests but are usually fought by poor young men without any. War is also why polygamy has been common throughout history - especially in smaller societies - because war reduces the young male population the most, leaving extra young women to become the second or third trophy wives of the rich old men, whether through polygamy or serial divorce and re-marriage.

With war, rich old men reduce both sides of the competition for booty, which comes in many forms.

PLACES. What's in a name? "*In every place with a name, they play the same territorial game.*"

Alexander the Great named many cities after himself, his boyfriend Hephaestion, and even his horse, Bucephalus. Not just **Alexandria** in Egypt (where he was crowned Pharaoh), but **Iskenderun** in Turkey (where he cut the Gordian Knot) and **Kandahar** in Afghanistan (where he married Roxanne) are all "Alexander" too, just in different languages.

In the Dr. Suess book "*Hop on Pop*" a little girl brags, in rhyme, that her "dad can read big words, too, like **Constantinople** and **Timbuktu**." Those big words are famous cities.

Timbuktu is in Mali, Africa on the northernmost bend of the Niger River (aka: *The Strong Brown God*.) It's been a great city for over a thousand years, which is why Dr. Suess knew about it. Timbuktu came to mean a mysterious or hard to find place, but that's only because it was so difficult for European explorers to get there. Most folks in West Africa were familiar and had far less trouble finding it.

Constantinople used to be called *Byzantium* and ancient Troy wasn't far, but a Roman Emperor moved the capital there (because Asia had more than Europe) and named it after himself. It worked for over 1000 years, but then the Ottoman Turks took the city, and they simply used their own language to say it: **Istanbul** is Constantinople, in Turkish. There's a song about it! (*They Might Be Giants*)

A book called "*Names on the Land*" by George Stewart tells how places (cities and physical features) in America got named. Most place names come in one of 10 kinds:

- Commemorative – **San Francisco** and all San/Santa/St. places commemorate the Saint.
- Commendatory – **Happy Valley** commends the people of the valley for being so optimistic.
- Incidents – **Show Low, AZ** was named after the *Deuce of Clubs* was drawn in a card game.
- Possession – **Baker City** tells us either who named it or who it got named after.
- Folk – **Sublimity** might be sublime. It reflects the culture/values of the hippie who named it.
- Manufactured – **Truth or Consequences, NM** and **Joe, Montana** were named afterwards.
- Mistakes – **Wagontire**. Real wagons don't have tires...do they?
- Shifts – **Portland, Madras and Damascus** are all in Oregon, but were somewhere else first.
- Descriptive – **Lakeview** did describe the place (but irrigation reduced the lake, and view of it)
- Associative – **Klamath Falls** associates the town with a nearby waterfall.

Last names come in many kinds, but there are 3 main ones:

1. *Who's your Daddy?* Johnson and bin Laden and O'Connor and McClain all tell.
2. *Where are you from?* Beaumont and Way and Villagrana and Hassard all tell.
3. *What do you do?* Baker and Miller and Smith and Wright and Carpenter all tell.

If a last named ended in "*-ster*" it meant a woman had done it: Weber/Webster, Brewer/Brewster, Spinner/Spinster. Brewster became common because single ladies working at Inns that brewed beer were very popular and often became pregnant without husbands. Spinster is a less common last name because those unmarried ladies just sat and spun.

The culture that named a place is often in the name. *Burg* is German, *Ville* is French, and *Town/Ton* is English. Pittsburgh and Harrisburg are in German Pennsylvania. Mandeville, St. Francisville, and Louisville are all near the Mississippi or Ohio Rivers, that the French explored first. Washington, Beaverton, and Charleston (and maybe Abston!) were all named by the English. The Spanish preferred "commemorating" the Saint of the Day but did name a few places in other ways, like Mesa, AZ and Raton, NM. The French commemorated a few Saints, too, like Paul and Louis. The Dutch swindled Manhattan from Native Americans and named "Descriptive" Brooklyn (Broken land) while giving other neighborhoods "Shift" names after places back in Holland, like Bronx and Harlem.

What's in a name? Plenty. Even the origins of some words are interesting:

Gossip – Originally "godsib" for "god" and "sibling" it meant personal information that only people related to you (like "siblings") would know. Think of "Godmother" or "Godfather" as close relations who know their godchild well. Regarding information, "gossip" still means about the same thing, but God probably isn't too involved in spreading it.

I know that quite a few of you are concerned that you are not receiving books that you have ordered. This is due to a **statewide** order from Mr. Stephen, Chief of Security. A statewide investigation has instructed the mailrooms to hold books from certain distributors until further notice. **OAC Rule: 291-131-0015 (5) – Excluding weekends and holidays, incoming and outgoing correspondence should be processed within two days of receipt; publications and packages within four days of receipt, unless the mail is being reviewed for possible violations. There are no time frames for conducting reviews.**

As soon as all clear is given, the mailroom will see that your books are delivered to you as soon as possible, (if the book is not on the rejected list). I cannot go through the books being held to tell anyone if they have been received yet.

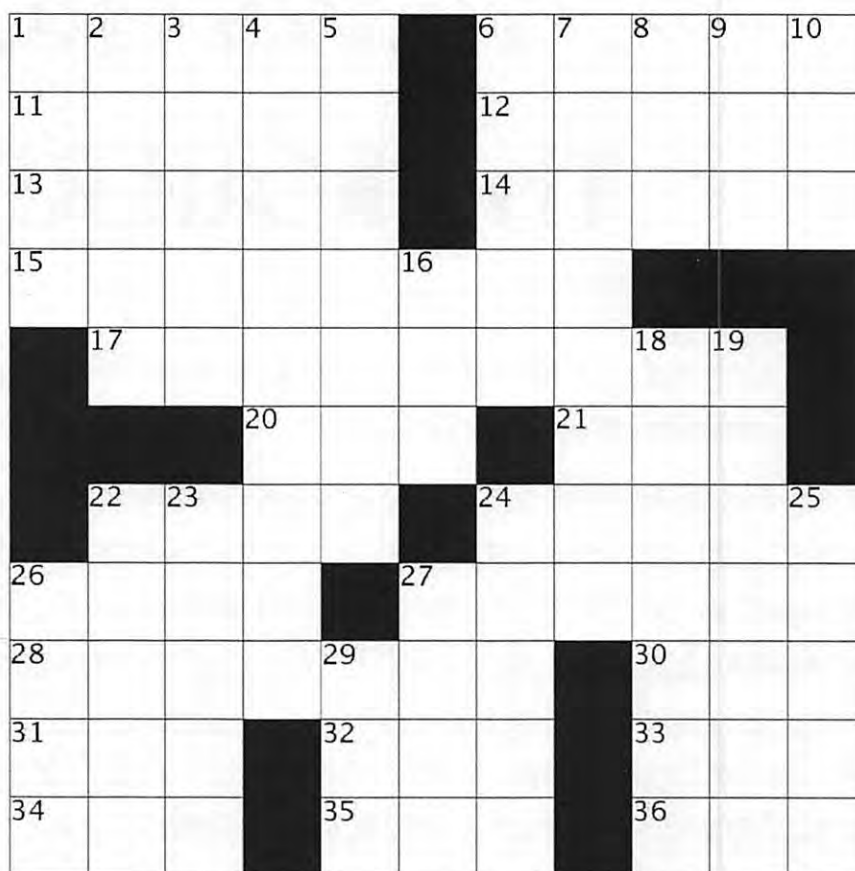
This situation is frustrating for everyone. Please have patience while we wait to have this situation resolved.



RE: Law Library Print Release Software Changes

The Law Library software used for printing in the ODOC law libraries has been updated statewide as the previous printing software is no longer supported. This change is occurring in March and April 2024. Law Library staff will help AICs with the transition. Going forward, when AICs print from the Thin Client workstations, this box will appear:

The AIC will enter their facility followed by their last name, first initial and SID # as the example shows above.

AICs at **Snake River Correctional Institution** will need to add C1, C2, or C3 behind SRCI. This will designate which Complex library will print.

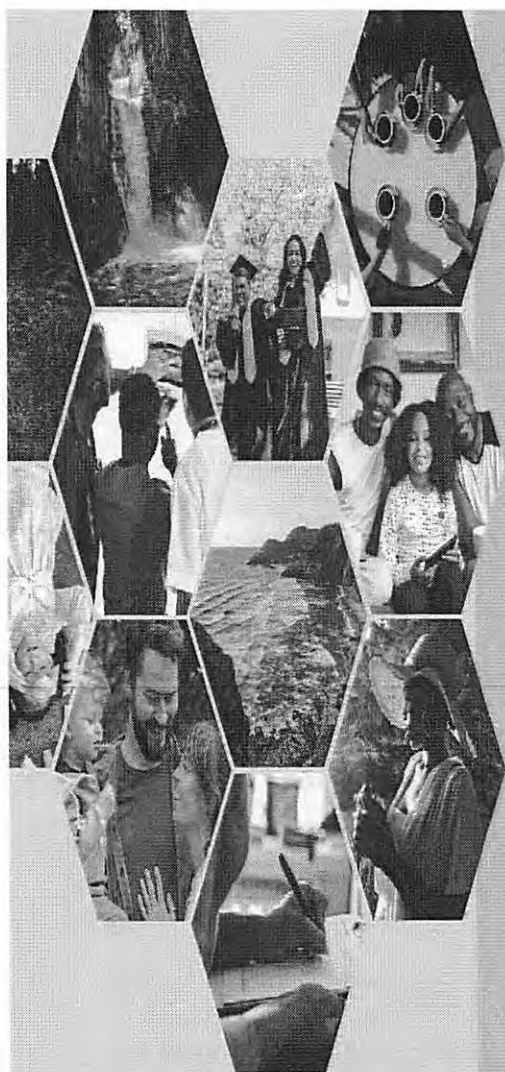
(Example: SRCIC1 – Smith, J 12345678)

AICs at **Two Rivers Correctional Institution** will need to add E or W behind TRCI. This will designate whether East or West library will print.

(Example TRCIE – Smith, J 12345678)

The cost for printing has not changed and will still be charged at 10 cents per page. However, all prints will be single-sided. Double-sided printing is not an option in this software. All documents sent for printing must contain the AIC's name and SID # on every page in accordance with OAR 291-139-0110(2) for verification of identity purposes.

AICs will still need to complete CD28 Request for Withdrawal of Funds and print request forms at the time of printing. Please remember to send a CD1714 Law Library Request Form for all law library requests.

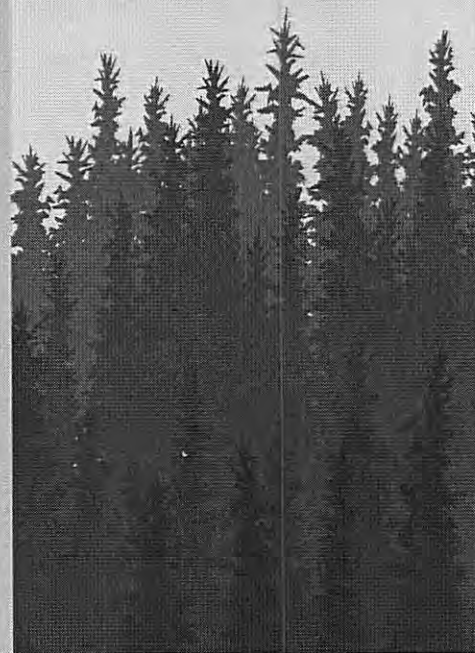

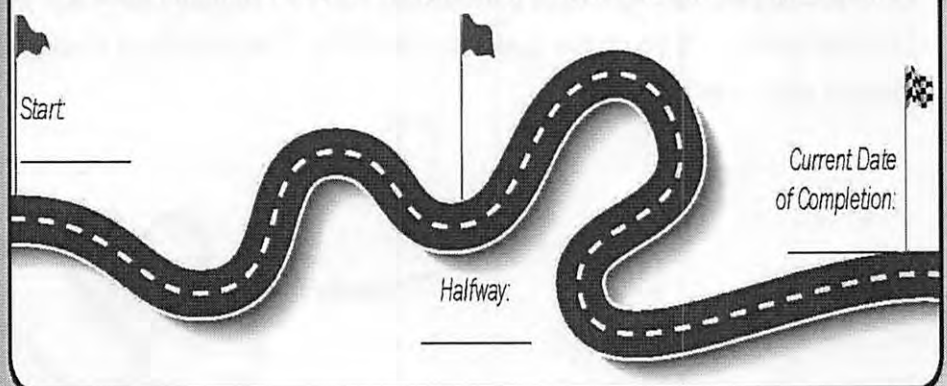

Medical Minute

All About Cholesterol

Cholesterol is a waxy substance similar to fat. The human body needs cholesterol to help build cells.

Our bodies make all the cholesterol that we need.

Having excess cholesterol increases your risk for heart disease or stroke.

What can increase my risk for high cholesterol?

Excess cholesterol comes from eating foods high in animal fat or "saturated" fat.

Being overweight and not getting enough exercise.

Using nicotine or tobacco in products like cigarettes, vaping or chewing tobacco.

Family history of high cholesterol.

How can I prevent high cholesterol?

Eat less saturated fat, avoid "trans fats" (partially hydrogenated oils) found in margarine, packaged food and fried food.

Avoid cured or processed meats and sugary drinks like soda.

Eat lean meat, fruits, vegetables and whole grains.

Lose weight if you are overweight.

Get at least 150 minutes of moderate intensity exercise each week. Moderate intensity is exercise that makes your heartbeat faster; but you are still able to talk while exercising.

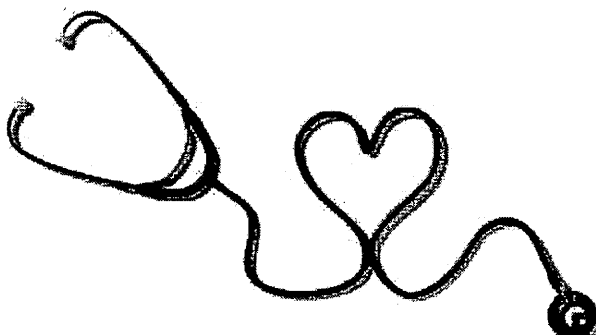
Exercise can be done in shorter sessions several times a day or longer sessions a few times a week. Example: 10 minutes sessions 3 times a day, 5 days a week OR 50 minute sessions 3 times a week.

Quit using tobacco or nicotine.

If diet changes and exercise don't help enough; your doctor may prescribe medications to help lower cholesterol.

Take prescription medications as ordered.

High cholesterol increases your risk for heart disease and stroke. By keeping your cholesterol levels low you can reduce your risk for these conditions. You can reduce many risk factors for high cholesterol by healthy lifestyle choices. If you have questions or need help managing cholesterol sign up for sick call to come and discuss with medical.

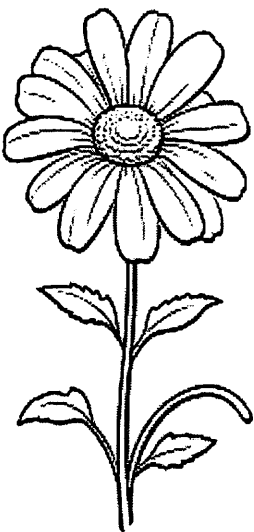

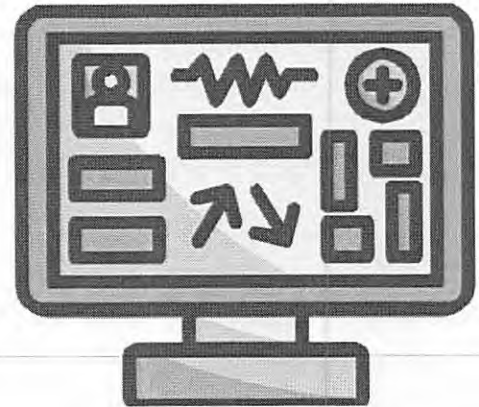

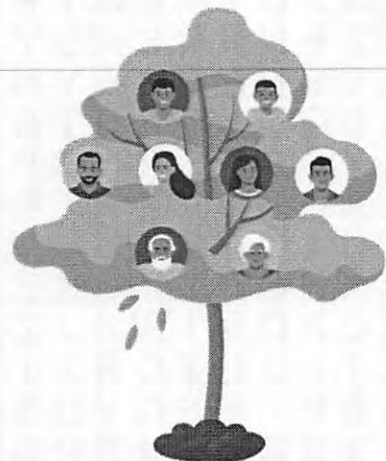
One **IMPORTANT** thing to remember is that, for now, **you still access health care, dental, and BHS how you always have in your institution.**
