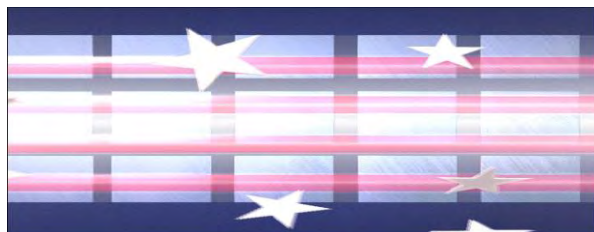

Kids FIRST is Lane County's Children's Advocacy Center. Our mission is to provide investigation and advocacy for children who are victims of, or to, crime. Children are referred to Kids FIRST by our witness's community partners: law enforcement, DHS Child Welfare, and medical professionals. Kids FIRST most often serves children for child sexual abuse, child neglect, severe neglect, or witness to domestic violence. Approximately 2/3 of the children we serve are under age 12.

Humane Society

Greenhill Humane Society has been caring for animals in Lane County since 1983 and operate the only animal shelter within the Eugene/Springfield area. Our programs include animal adoptions; reuniting lost animals with their families; disaster response; crisis care boarding in situations of domestic violence, medical emergencies, and other crisis situations; spay/neuter services; roaming, un-owned community cats; a pet pantry; on-site volunteer opportunities; and care and humane education.

## High Desert Toastmasters Support Project Lemonade

The High Desert Toastmasters International Club was honored to welcome Ms. Gail Anderson, Community Engagement Manager for Project Lemonade to receive the \$709 check that club members had raised through a fundraiser selling pizzas to other AICs at TRCI.

During the presentation each of the Toastmasters club members had the opportunity to introduce themselves and share how long they had been involved in Toastmasters. The club members also shared with Ms. Anderson a little about why they had chosen to raise funds for Project Lemonade. Former Club President Angel Figueroa had proposed the idea of a fundraiser for an organization supporting foster youth. Many club members had experiences with the foster care system and wanted to help support an organization in Oregon that helped foster youth with personal development and practical life needs.

Ms. Gail Anderson shared with the TI club members that Project Lemonade's mission is inspiring self-esteem to help youth in foster care thrive. The organization provides support for foster youth in throughout Oregon through five main areas including the Project Lemonade Store, LEARN Internship, WISH, The Inspire Network, and Fill the Gap Scholarship.

**First**, The Project Lemonade Store provides basic needs for foster youth ages 5-24 to shop free of charge for new and on-trend clothing, shoes, and accessories.

**Second**, through the LEARN Internship youth ages 16-24 can also get valuable job experience with a 12-week paid internship working at the Project Lemonade store, and they also get training to help them pursue and achieve their employment and education goals.

**Third**, the WISH programs provide grants up to \$400 to help with the cost of foster youth trying out activities such as attending special camps, playing on a sports team, learning to play an instrument, or other extracurricular and enrichment activities.

**Fourth**, the Inspire Network helps youth ages 14 to 23 expecting to age out of foster care with building support community around them through social events, volunteer opportunities, career exploration, and one on one mentoring to assist navigating life's challenge and reach their personal goals.

**Last but not least**, the Fill the Gap Scholarship helps relieve financial stress for foster youth seeking to pursue higher education. The scholarship up to \$4,000 can be used for tuition, housing, transportation, technology, or other necessary items for achieving their education goals.

The Toastmasters Club members also had the opportunity to ask Ms. Anderson several other questions as well before a picture was taken of Ms. Anderson official receiving the donation check on from the High Desert Toastmasters Club on behalf of Project Lemonade.

Ms. Anderson closed with stating that no matter where you are in life currently, advocacy is the best way to help support foster care youth.

# FROM THE MAILROOM

- 1.) A reminder to anyone purchasing books/magazines from the e-commerce website eBay; **Independent sellers on eBay are not considered publishers/distributors.** Any Books/magazines purchased through eBay containing the sellers personal address will be refused and returned to the sender. No mail violation is generated when this is done and no notice to the AIC is given. With that said, if a publication is purchased from a legitimate business on eBay and it is sent from a business address, we will process the publication like normal.
- 2.) A reminder to anyone purchasing Notebooks from Amazon or other distributors: According to OAR 291-131- 0025(7) **“New and used books, magazines, newspapers, and blank journals shall only be received directly from the publisher or distributor.”** Notebooks are not considered “Journals” and therefore are not allowed to be processed. When ordering journals, please ensure that they are identified as Journals and not Notebooks.
- 3.) If a tracking number is needed/requested on a mailer/pkg, a kyte (filled out with your information) MUST be attached for the tracking number to be sent back to you. Even if a CD-28 is NOT attached. The Mail Room does NOT save tracking numbers.
- 4.) Be mindful that the mail Room only has contact with your mail for a miniscule fraction of its travels. Just because you do not get mail in a timely fashion, that does not mean the mail room is holding it. USPS, UPS & FedEx all have their own staffing & handling issues, and hold-ups that are beyond our control.

# RELEASE SERVICES

- If you are under 3 years to release kyte Ms. Nestalhi to join Release Gogi, or Personal Development Release Group!!
- The Reentry and Release Community Outreach Session, organized by the Oregon Department of Corrections Reentry and Release Unit, aims to support incarcerated individuals who are nearing release from custody. The session offers a valuable opportunity for friends and family of those preparing for release to understand the processes, timelines, and available services that their loved ones will navigate during this transition.

The session will cover:

- **Timelines and Processes:** Explanation of the key steps in the release process, including when and how incarcerated individuals will engage with release counselors, transition coordinators, and the benefits team.
- **Support Services:** An overview of the various services offered to assist in the successful reintegration of individuals back into the community.
- **Q&A:** Reentry and Release staff will address general questions from attendees, but specific case-related questions will be directed to the incarcerated individual or their assigned release counselor, provided that a release of information form is signed by the individual.

This session is in partnership with **Oregon Citizens United for Rehabilitation of Errants (CURE)**. By attending, family and friends will be better equipped to understand the release process and support their loved ones in the months leading to their release. ## VICTIM SERVICES PROGRAMS

### RESPONSIBILITY LETTER BANK

The Responsibility Letter Bank is a structured letter writing process that provides adults in custody (AIC) with the opportunity to demonstrate responsibility for their crimes and express remorse for the harm they may have caused.

The program provides crime victims/survivors with the choice to receive information in a safe manner.

- ◆ AIC's may initiate the process by applying to participate in the program
- ◆ Crime victims/survivors may inquire with Victim Services to find if they have a letter available for them
- ◆ Victims are not contacted about the availability of a letter if they have not registered with the Bank through Victim Services
- ◆ Victims decide whether or not they wish to receive a responsibility letter and whether or not the AIC is informed that the victim received or read the letter
- ◆ Participation does not constitute permission for the AIC to make additional contact
- ◆ Victims may choose to respond to a responsibility letter through the program, however, further correspondence requires the approval to participate in the FDP
- ◆ Letters will be reviewed by the Victim Services Program for appropriateness
- ◆ Accepted AIC letters will be deposited in the Responsibility Letter Bank maintained by Victim Services
- ◆ Letters are voluntary and will not affect an AICs good time, release date, or post-prison conditions

## Anuncios en el su celda y subtítulos

Título II de la Ley de Americanos con Discapacidades (Americans with Disabilities Act en inglés) requiere que los gobiernos estatales y locales brinden igualdad de acceso a programas, servicios y actividades para las personas con discapacidades. Esto significa que los AIC sordos o con problemas de audición deben tener el mismo acceso a la televisión y a los anuncios de la unidad. DOC proporciona el mismo acceso asegurándose de que haya subtítulos disponibles, cuando se ofrezcan, y de que todos los anuncios se hagan en la sala de estar, el patio y las celdas.

## In Cell Announcements and Close Captions

Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) requires state and local governments to provide equal access to programs, services, and activities for people with disabilities. This means that AICs who are deaf or hard of hearing should have the same access to the TV and unit announcements. DOC provides equal access by making sure close captioning is available, when offered, and all announcements are made in the dayroom, yard, and cells.

# Changes to the Mail Rule

## Effective 1/13/2025

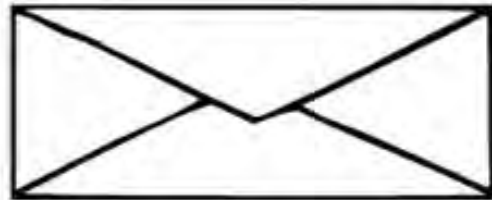
Effective January 13, 2025, the Mail Rule has been revised to address concerns regarding safety, security, and the well-being of both Adults in Custody (AICs) and staff. Mail postmarked after this date will be subject to the revised rule.

### Some of the new requirements that friends and family of AICs should be aware of include:

- Incoming mail must be in pen, lead pencil, or be typewritten or photocopied.
- Incoming mail must be written on standard weight (20 pound or less) white paper. This is standard copy/print paper.
- Incoming mail must be enclosed in a commercially produced envelope using standard weight (20 pound or less) white paper that is no larger than 9" x 12".

**There are no changes to the  
Legal Mail requirements**

This information is also being provided to your friends and family in the Visiting lobby, via the F&F emailed newsletter, and on the DOC Facebook page.



### Examples of items that will be refused:

- Any non-white envelope
- Envelopes larger than 9" x 12"
- Envelopes that are not commercially produced
- Envelopes made of cardboard, padded, corrugated, or tear-resistant material
- Envelopes constructed of heavy weight paper (that is, greater than 20 pound) or with security screening features
- Cardstock (such as is used for greeting cards and postcards)

**Greeting cards and postcards  
are not allowed.**

# Attention!!

Release Services are providing 3 groups/classes for those AIC's getting ready to release home. This is aside from the "Road to Success" transition services, and initial regular release class. The 3 groups/ classes are:

## 1. GOGI (Getting Out By Going In)

"Getting Out By Going In" helps you "Get Out" of negative situations by "Going In" to your own ability to find the solutions to your problems. These 12 tools for positive decision making will be taught once a week for 90 minutes for 12 weeks.

## 2. Let's Go! (formerly known as PRD)

This is a class taught by Ms. Nestalhi that takes a deeper look into yourself and the issues that hold you back from becoming the person you were meant to be. This will be once a week for 2 & a half hours for 10 weeks

## 3. Restorative Justice

Addresses the connection between offender and victim and looks at the impact & effects on the community. This class will be once a week for 2 & a half hours for 5 weeks (starts when "Let's Go!" is completed)

To sign up for these classes please send kytes to **Ms. Nestalhi** at **Release Services**. You will be placed on a waitlist, determined by release date. Eligibility is 3 years or less to release or 3 years from seeing the parole board to sign up for these classes.

**PRISON RAPE ELIMINATION ACT  
(PREA INFORMATION)**

The Oregon Department of Corrections (ODOC) has a zero-tolerance policy for sexual abuse, sexual harassment and for retaliation for reporting an incident. You may report in person to any staff, through an inmate communication, through the grievance system, by calling the PREA hotline by dialing 9 from any inmate phone.

**Filing an Anonymous PREA Report**

If you are uneasy about filing a PREA allegation, you may file an anonymous report with an outside agency.

Please indicate in the beginning of your letter you are filing a PREA allegation and you are requesting to remain anonymous. The Governor's Office will refer all anonymous allegations to the DOC PREA Coordinator to assure an investigation is completed based off the information that is provided.

**Community-Based PREA Advocacy (Support) Program**

ODOC has partnered with community based, confidential advocates of sexual abuse victims to provide services to inmates. Inmates at ODOC who have experienced sexual abuse may reach a community-based advocate by dialing 711 inmate telephone systems, or may request a private call through the PREA Compliance Manager at the facility. Advocates provide victims of sexual abuse information about their options, resources, information and emotional support. There is no charge for calls to advocates.

**Role of an Advocate:**

- Provide confidential support and crisis intervention
- Inform you about the investigation and medical examination process
- Educate you about healing from sexual abuse
- Offer resources and referrals

**Advocates will:**

- Not tell you what to do
- Not communicate with the institution unless you request them to do so and sign a release
- Not provide legal advice

Community-based advocacy centers provide sexual abuse support to people of all genders. Community-based advocates will not report unless you request them to do so and if you sign a release of information.

Telephone calls and mail with community-based advocacy centers is considered privileged communication and will be handled similar to legal calls/official mail.
